It's the end of summer and we've been casually dressed for a good spell. Why Not dust off our "Sunday Best" and dress up for worship on September 10.



Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates. (Deuteronomy 6:4-9 NIV)



These verses in Deuteronomy are known as the Shema, a prayer recited by Jews morning and evening, each and every day. What concerns me is the verse, "Impress them on your children," I am deeply disturbed about the drift toward Bible illiteracy in our younger generations. I am concerned about it in our greater society, but troubled more by our own younger people in our community of faith. I'm worried our children will be raised without a solid foundation of Bible knowledge. I am concerned they won't know the stories of Jesus and our redemption through him. I know we have discussed Sunday School for the children. I know it is difficult to find teachers. I know it is difficult to get children here on a Sunday morning. That being said, I would like for us to consider two things.

It would be good if our congregation had one evening per week to provide some of the things we could be doing as a church. I believe everyone needs to be in some form of Bible Study. All of us need to know the over arching history of God's work with humanity. We don't get that knowledge by reading one verse in a morning's devotion. Secondly, an evening per

week could provide time and space for our younger generations to also learn the Bible as well as build some community among themselves. An evening per week would provide time and space for other groups to find time. It could be a time for a choir to meet. It would be nice to have a weekly time of food and fellowship. We can each pitch in a few bucks and have pizza, or subs, or BBQ. Let's think about this further.

Secondly, the passage addresses the parental responsibilities in religious education, "Impress them on your children, talk about it when you sit at home, or walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up." These verses stress the need for parents to be responsible for their children's education. The church can help here as well. Let us know your needs for curriculum for the home and we'll try and provide them to you.

Could it be that this article will spawn some discussion? I hope so, our younger people deserve at least that!

* The hopes are the day/time would be consistent to allow for teacher planning and preparation. 60-minute weekly visits are suggested, but visits may be more frequent/extended as you are willing/able. Anytime you can spare and share is appreciated! It is important to know that Henrico Public Schools requires all volunteers to complete a volunteer application (https://henricoschools.us/volunteers/). Once the application is complete, the prospective volunteer will receive an email of receipt, and another once approved. From there, visits will be based on the schedule developed per volunteer availability.

CAN'T PARTICIPATE IN-PERSON: If you are not able to provide in-person support, no worries. Adams has opportunities to assist in other ways — Donations of gently used clothing for their clinic and families in crisis; Gift card of \$5 or \$10 denominations for student attendance incentives (attendance is linked to school accreditation). Places in close proximity and frequently visited by their students - Chick-fil-A, McDonald's, Marco's Pizza, Five Below, Little Ceasar's, Dollar Tree, Walmart, Target.

It too, addresses, the pain we all feel when racism occurs in such blatant fashion. I continue to ask myself, "what do we do?" We speak to it when we see it. We stand alongside those who experience it. We advocate for change in policy that is bias against people of color. But, perhaps, most importantly, we pray. We pray for God's intervention in the hearts and minds of people. We pray that all people would come to see that every person, no matter the color of their skin or ethnicity is made in the image of God.

And we pray for God's kingdom come, on earth as it is in heaven.

CLERGY & CITIZENS AGAINST RACISM PROTESTS THE RACIALLY MOTIVATED MURDERS IN JACKSONVILLE, FLORIDA

The members of Clergy & Citizens Against Racism (CCAR) are sickened by the recent hate-motivated murders that took place in Jacksonville, Florida, on August 26, 2023. Once again, families have been left to mourn the loss of loved ones who were murdered by a white supremacist filled with hate.

Three African Americans were murdered at a Dollar General store in Jacksonville, Florida. Jacksonville's sheriff, T.K. Waters, said the racially motivated murders were the result of "a disgusting ideology of hate." The same ideology of hate that was responsible for the killing of 11 Jews at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; 23 people of mostly Latino descent at a Walmart in El Paso, Texas; 10 African Americans at a Tops Friendly Markets supermarket in Buffalo, New York; and a young Black gay man in Brooklyn, New York.

If the above list provokes an emotional catharsis within you, it should—for it represent lives lost simply because of race, faith, sexual orientation, or gender identification. These hate-motivated murders are becoming all-too-common occurrences that leave our country numb—to the horrors of the events themselves and to the reality that the evils motivated by hate will likely manifest again.

Contrary to white supremacist calls to "Make America Great Again," America is already a great nation that is too diverse to continue tolerating the hatred that is being perpetrated against its communities that are home to people of color, Jews, and LGBTQIA+ individuals.

Unfortunately, the notion of confronting this hatred has not yet breached the ranks of the Republican candidates for president. Immediately after the Jacksonville murders, former Vice President Mike Pence and Florida Governor Ron DeSantis quickly offered prayers for the families of the three individuals who were murdered, yet neither man had the courage to address the subject of white supremacy or access to guns, which were most certainly at the root of this most recent tragedy and other racially motivated murders.

Even more insulting to the victims of the Jacksonville attack, Republican presidential candidate Vivek Ramaswamy moved with expedience to connect the white gunman's violent attack with the crisis of mental illness in this country. Mental illness has increasingly become the escape route politicians use to sidestep having frank discussions about white supremacy and the proliferation of guns in America.

And so the question will continue to be asked: "What can we do to stem the tide of hate-motivated murders and terrorism?" We may not have all of the answers, but there is one thing CCAR cannot afford to do, and that is to sit by and do absolutely nothing!

God bless America and the families that have been torn apart by these cruel, senseless, and hatemotivated murders.
