New Testament Reading

Mark 6:1-13 NRSVUE

6 He left that place and came to his hometown, and his disciples followed him. ² On the Sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, "Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! ³ Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offense at him. ⁴ Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honor, except in their hometown and among their own kin and in their own house." ⁵ And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few

sick people and cured them. ⁶ And he was amazed at their unbelief.

Then he went about among the villages teaching. ⁷ He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. ⁸ He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff: no bread, no bag, no money in their belts, ⁹ but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. ¹⁰ He said to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. ¹¹ If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." ¹² So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. ¹³ They cast out many demons and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

Moment in Black Brethren History

Brethren Encyclopedia

John T. Lewis (1835-1906) was born in Carroll County, Maryland and was a freeman. And in 1853 he joined the Dunker (now known as the Church of the Brethren) congregation at the Meadow Branch meetinghouse. One of the people he worked for as a coachman was Jervis Langdon, Mark Twain's father-in-law. The two became friends and some believe that Lewis was the model for Jim in Twain's book Huckleberry Finn.

Mark Twain called John "the most picturesque of men" and "an implacable Dunker-Baptist." John was one of the few black members of the Brethren in the years before the Civil War, having united with the Pipe Creek congregation in Maryland in 1853 when he was eighteen years old.

Samuel L. Clemens (Mark Twain) had many reasons to admire Lewis, his friend for more than thirty years. Lewis had served as coachman for Clemens' father-in-law and later was a tenant farmer at Quarry Farm near Elmira, NY, where the famous writer spent many summers. On August 23, 1877, Lewis saved the lives of Clemens' sister-in-law, Ida Langdon, her young daughter Julia, and Nora, a nurse, when a runaway horse carried their carriage dangerously downhill toward a turn in the road.

Clemens, in a letter to his friend, William Dean Howells, described how Lewis, who was coming up the hill with a load of manure, "gathered his vast strength and ... seized the gray horse's bit as he plunged by and fetched him up standing!"

The rewards that John Lewis received for his courageous act enabled him to pay off his debts and to help his father, who still lived in Maryland. In a letter of thanks for the gifts received, Lewis said, "Inasmuch as divine providence saw fit to use me as an instrument for the saving of those presshious lives, the honner conferd upon me was greater than the feat performed." That sentence, wrote Mark Twain, raised his letter to "the dignity of literature."

Lewis, in preparing his own obituary, observed that he had long been cut off from the church, but he wrote, "I have tried to be faithful the New Testament and order of the Brethren."

Scripture Lesson

¹⁴ King Herod heard of it, for Jesus's name had become known. Some were saying, "John the baptizer has been raised from the dead, and for this reason these powers are at work in him." ¹⁵ But others said, "It is Elijah." And others said, "It is a prophet,

like one of the prophets of old." ¹⁶ But when Herod heard of it, he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised."

¹⁷ For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. ¹⁸ For John had been telling Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." ¹⁹ And Herodias had a grudge against him and wanted to kill him. But she could not, ²⁰ for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed, and yet he liked to listen to him. ²¹ But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. 22 When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests, and the king said to the girl, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it." ²³ And he swore to her, "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom." ²⁴ She went out and said to her mother, "What should I ask for?" She replied, "The head of John the baptizer." ²⁵ Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, "I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter." ²⁶ The king was deeply grieved, yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her. ²⁷ Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, ²⁸ brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. ²⁹ When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body and laid it in a tomb.
