# Mark 5:1-20 Tell Them What the Lord Has Done WRCoB 1.21.24

Our Sunday school class recently studied a book Entitled, *The World, The Flesh, and the Devil* By Richard Rohr.

What I thought was interesting
Was not so much the book itself
But the many perspectives
We, the class, had on evil.

The class had mixed opinions on the origins of evil
Ranging from evil acts precipitated by
Humanity's immoral desires and choices

To the recognition of a supernatural evil

An evil apart not originating from human beings.

It seems as if as we were fuller enlightened We've discarded the concept of evil

As an entity of itself

Having the ability to possess

And control one's life.

Evil nowadays is simply bad choices

Made from selfish desires

But we are confronted with this story.
What do we do with it?

Do we write it off as superstitious thinking?

That the people of that time were ignorant

That we now know better?

That Jesus, himself, was ill-informed?

That rather then being possessed by an evil spirit
What this man was experiencing
Was a schizophrenic psychotic episode
And was probably off his meds?

Do we get to pick and choose What to believe, in regards, to what Jesus said?

Before we answer that question

Let take another look at our story.

Following a wild night on the lake

Pummeled by a severe storm

Jesus and the disciples came across the lake
And landed in the Gentile region of Gerasenes.

A man with an evil spirit came to Jesus.

This tortured man was to be pitied..

He lived in a cemetery.

No one could do anything to restrain him No one was strong enough.

Night and day, he would cry out

He would howl

He would self-mutilate.

The evil spirit in him was named Legions Meaning lots and lots of spirits.

Jesus told the unclean spirit to come out!

The evil spirits pleaded with Jesus Not to send them away.

So, Jesus sent them into a herd of pigs

And, now possessed they jumped off a cliff

And drowned in the lake below.

The hog farmers having just witnessed

Their investments literally take a plunge

Ran back to the village.

After hearing what Jesus had done
Instead of praising God
They wanted him to leave town.

So as Jesus was getting back into the boat The man who had the evil spirit Approached Jesus.

He begged to go with Jesus.

#### Mark 5:19 CEB

<sup>19</sup> But Jesus wouldn't allow it. "Go home to your own people," Jesus said, "and tell them what the Lord has done for you and how he has shown you mercy."

And so, according to the Gospel of Mark
This once demon-possessed man
Became Jesus' first commissioned evangelist

And the people were amazed.

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According to science, evil originates from humankind.

Baumeister & Vohs, (2004) identify four roots of evil

- 1. Idealistic evil: end justify the means
- 2. Egotism and revenge
- 3. Instrumental evil: evil as a means to an end
- 4. Sadistic pleasure

Baumeister claims all evil comes from One of these sources.

It's a rather compelling argument.

And actually, there are Biblical insights
That suggests this as well.

Here's two examples from James

James 1:14-15 NIV

<sup>14</sup> but each person is tempted when they are dragged away by their own evil desire and enticed. <sup>15</sup> Then, after desire has conceived, it gives birth to sin; and sin, when it is full-grown, gives birth to death.

James 4:1-2 NIV

4 What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you? <sup>2</sup> You desire but do not have, so you kill. You covet but you cannot get what you want, so you quarrel and fight.

It initially appears that James agrees

With the psychological view

That evil originates from humankind.

EXCEPT, just a few verses later

James 4:7-8 CEV

<sup>7</sup> Surrender to God! Resist the devil, and he will run from you. <sup>8</sup> Come near to God, and he will come near to you

James appears to see the root of evil

As both coming from our own evil desire

And coming from the devil.

The problem, as I see it
Is that evil, from a scientific perspective
Does not acknowledge the supernatural.

But we, who believe in God, do!

We believe in a supernatural God
Who created and sustains our physical world

We believe in Jesus, the Son of God Who is both human and divine

And we believe in a Holy Spirit

Who guides and inspires and comforts.

We believe in a spirit world.

So really, is it all that much of a stretch

To consider evil forces at work against us?

The problem comes in, of course
Is that if we believe in a God
Who is all powerful and all-loving

Who created the heavens and the earth
And called all of what was created good

Then how could evil exist In a good world created by a good God?

Well, beginning back in Genesis 3
We see that out of all the animals God created
The serpent was craftier than any other

It's believed the devil entered the serpent.

And since then evil has run rampant In humankind and the world.

We also see in the Book of Job

That angels come into the LORD's presence.

Satan also came.

#### Job 1:7 CEV

<sup>7</sup> the Lord asked, "Satan, where have you been?" Satan replied, "I have been going all over the earth."

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Satan was an angel who fell from grace.

### **Luke 10:18 CEB**

<sup>18</sup> Jesus replied, "I saw Satan fall from heaven like lightning.

The Bible believes in evil as supernatural.

The Bible explains that the heavenly host
Was also created with free will
And could choose to go against God.

## Jude 6 NLT

<sup>6</sup> And I remind you of the angels who did not stay within the limits of authority God gave them but left the place where they belonged.

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To me one of the more convincing passages
In all of Scripture that identifies the entity of evil

Was written by Paul.

**Ephesians 6:12 CEB** 

<sup>12</sup> We aren't fighting against human enemies but against rulers, authorities, forces of cosmic darkness, and spiritual powers of evil in the heavens.

I mean, how else do you explain
The terrible evils in our world?

Can you explain away the evils of the Holocaust

Or the Hutus genocide of the Tutsis

The oppression of so many people groups

By simply saying bad choices?

How do you explain the evils of mass shootings?

Of human trafficking, terrorism, child abuse Cyber crime and identity theft?

How do you explain institutional evils?

#### C. S. Lewis writes

"There are two equal and opposite errors into which our race can fall about devils," C. S. Lewis noted in <u>The Screwtape Letters</u>.

"One is to disbelieve in their existence. The other is to believe, and to feel an excessive and unhealthy interest in them."

The Washington Post ran an op-ed piece titled

As a psychiatrist, I diagnose mental illness. Also, I help spot demonic possession.

The author, Richard Gallagher
Is a board-certified psychiatrist
And a professor of clinical psychiatry
At New York Medical College.

His credentials are impeccable
Princeton, Yale and Colombia
Some of his alma maters.

This is what he wrote.

For the past two-and-a-half decades and over several hundred consultations, I've helped clergy from multiple denominations and faiths to filter episodes of mental illness—which represent the overwhelming majority of cases—from, literally, the devil's work.

It's an unlikely role for an academic physician, but I don't see these two aspects of my career in conflict. The same habits that shape what I do as a professor and psychiatrist—open-mindedness, respect for evidence and compassion for suffering people—led me to aid in the work of discerning attacks by what I believe are evil spirits and, just as critically, differentiating these extremely rare events from medical conditions.

Is it possible to be a sophisticated psychiatrist and believe that evil spirits are, however seldom, assailing humans?

Most of my scientific colleagues and friends say no, because of their frequent contact with patients who are deluded about demons, their general skepticism of the supernatural, and their commitment to employ only standard, peer-reviewed treatments that do not potentially mislead (a definite risk) or harm vulnerable patients.

But careful observation of the evidence presented to me in my career has led me to believe that certain extremely uncommon cases can be explained no other way.
